It is jammed packed with history and biblical facts that we should or may already know. Now on to why Jesus didn't drink. Gr. chole (Matthew 27:34), the LXX. Translation of the Hebrew Rosh in Psalms 69; 21, which foretells our Lord's sufferings. The drink offered to our Lord was vinegar (made of light wine rendered acid, the common drink of Roman soldiers) "mingled with gall," or, according to (Mark 15:23), "mingled with myrrh;" both expressions meaning the same thing, namely, that the vinegar was made bitter by the infusion of wormwood or some other bitter substance, usually given, according to a merciful custom, as an anodyne to those who were crucified, to render them insensible to pain. Our Lord, knowing this, refuses to drink it. He would take nothing to cloud his faculties or blunt the pain of dying. He chooses to suffer every element of woe in the bitter cup of agony given him by the Father (John 18:11).

Who among our numbers, or even yet who in the world is willing to submit to the pain that our savior suffered? Who is willing to lay down their life period? And yet our Savior did it and in the most painful manner. Easter is not about the Easter bunny or brightly colored eggs and hunts, but that our Lord and Savior who suffered a horrible and painful death on the cross, which he did for us, for our salvation and so we may have everlasting life.

No matter where you spend this Easter, and I hope that it is at church or a sunrise service near you and yes I am asking you to choose one this Easter Sunday. I will be at Easter sunrise service in our nations capital. Our Grand Prelate and I were hoping to be able to organize a bus trip and make that available to transport a large delegation of Florida Sir Knights to Washington D.C. for Easter Sunrise Service, but at the moment it is cost prohibited.
