This is a rare and beautiful time to celebrate the resurrection of our Lord at the break of the first rays of the sun. FOR WHOM THE BELL TOLLS

In December of 1623, while recovering from a deadly fever, English poet John Donne wrote a meditation inspired by the church bell he heard ringing, fearing it was announcing his own imminent death. In what later became known as Mediation XVII, he writes, "No man is an island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the continent, a part of the main. If a clod washes away, Europe is less... any man's death diminishes me, because I am involved in mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee." The often-quoted lines remind us not just of our own death, but also of the ever-changing community of mankind. Death, illness, and loss diminish us, but birth and growth rebuild. We are all connected to each other, directly or indirectly. Working together we are capable of great triumph, but working against each other, we are capable of the profound tragedy. The Grand High Priest, Grand Illustrious Master, and I have chosen the image of a bell in reference to this passage for our theme this year to signify this message of unity and humility. We have inherited an amazing legacy in the York Rite that is over 200 years old. As we travel across the state this year, we will be sharing this message in hopes of reminding the Companions and Sir Knights of this great state that we are involved in this together, and remind us that when "the bell tolls," whether it be for the loss of a brother, a building, or a York Rite body, it tolls for thee.
