February is also a time for romanticism, a day whose origins are not quite so romantic. Flowers, candy, red hearts and romance, that's what Valentine's Day is all about, right? Well, maybe not.

The origin of this holiday for the expression of love really isn't romantic at all. There are many versions of its origin. One suggests that St. Valentine was a Roman Priest at during a period when there was an emperor by the name of Claudias II who persecuted the church at that particular time.

The emperor had an edict that prohibited the marriage of young people. This was based on the hypothesis that unmarried soldiers fought better than married soldiers because married soldiers might be afraid of

what might happen to them or their wives or families if they died. We must bear in mind that it was a very permissive society in which Valentine lived, Polygamy would have been much more popular than just one woman and one man living together. And yet some of them seemed to be attracted to Christian faith. But obviously the church considered marriage to be very sacred between one man and one woman for life and that it was to be encouraged. And so it immediately presented the problem to the Christian church of what to do about this.

The idea of encouraging these young people to marry within the Christian church was what Valentine was all about. He secretly married them because of the emperors edict.

Valentine was eventually caught, imprisoned and tortured for performing marriage ceremonies against the command of Emperor Claudius II. There are many legends surrounding Judge Valentine's actions while in prison. One such legend is of a man, Asterius, who was to him in line with the Roman law at the time. Asterius daughter, who was blind, was supposed to have prayed with Valentine and the young girl was healed with such astonishing effect that Asterius himself became a Christian.

In the year 269 AD, Valentine was sentenced to a three part execution of a beating, stoning, and finally decapitation, all because of his stand for Christian marriage. The story goes that the last words he wrote were in a note to Asterius' daughter. He inspired today's romantic missives by signing it, "from your Valentine. Probably the most plausible story surrounding St. Valentine is one not focused on passionate love but his love of God. He was martyred for refusing to renounce his religion.
