This month, we celebrate the single most important event in our country's history, the birth of the United States of America through the signing and publication of the Declaration of Independence. This event officially kicked off the American Revolution that ultimately led to the creation of the greatest, strongest, most innovative country in the world. Largely considered to be established on Judeo-Christian principles, it is difficult to deny the influence of Freemasonry in the creation of the United States.

It is said that one of the main goals of Freemasonry is to make good men better, yet it is the influence of many of these particular men that contributed to the ideals and behaviors that led to the birth of our nation. When we examine our founding documents, we realize that many of the developers and signers were established Freemasons, or heavily influenced by them. It is believed that due to Washington's involvement and leadership in the fraternity, and because he surrounded himself with officers and enlisted men who were also members of the craft, Washington felt that our military secrets were as safe as they could possibly be, considering his faith in the principle tenets and influence of masonic teachings.

Ironically, Brother Washington was, in fact, not a signer of our premier founding document.

Brother John Hancock served multiple times as President of the Continental Congress, and was the first to sign the Declaration of Independence, defying and denying the authority of King George III over our fledgling nation. Brother Benjamin Franklin, at the signing of the document, famously quipped, "We must all hang together, or assuredly we shall all hang separately," perhaps an apt metaphor for the struggles we face today.

As further evidence of Masonic influence on our country's establishment, we may look to the basic philosophies of the craft:

- Fatherhood of God
- Brotherhood of Man
- Relief of our fellow human beings
- All Mighty Power of Truth.

At the time of the Revolution, we certainly didn't see much evidence of these revolutionaries advancing the peaceful and loving teachings of Christ, or the agenda of any particular church or religion, just the desire to set themselves free from tyranny and oppression, at almost any cost. The vast rule of royalty and aristocracy had no place in our new nation, where our Founders established the freedoms we now enjoy to this day.
