The next Grand Conclave is for the Grand Commandery of Arkansas (Little Rock, March 20-21). In the months that follow are the Grand Conclaves for the Grand Commandery of Texas (Waco, April 16-19), the Grand Commandery of Oklahoma (Oklahoma City, April 23-25), and the Grand Commandery of Kansas (Topeka, April 30-May 2). These events take a great amount of planning by the Grand Officers of each Grand Commandery and it is important for the Sir Knights in each jurisdiction to attend them.

MOTIVATION AND LEADERSHIP

Each year our Commanderies select the Officers for the next year. Installations are usually festive events. The new Commander has the spotlight. It is sparkly and new. It is his 15 minutes of fame. It is handshakes and congratulations.

Then the first meeting rolls around and the new Commander must now pay the piper. He must, per his obligation, take up the reins of leadership and actually do something with his Commandery. One of the first challenges for the new Commander is to motivate his troops, to get their attention, so they will listen.

"Our Commandery doesn't do anything, so I don't waste my time going anymore!" "Someone needs to do something or we are going to lose our Commandery!" "What we need to do is get a bunch of new members to replace the ones that don't come anymore!" The new Commander is confronted or possibly overwhelmed by the opinions and attitudes of the members. What should he do? How should he proceed? Here are a few ideas for our new Commanders.

Before we can successfully recruit new members, we must get the current members excited about Templary and their Commandery. The challenge is getting them to listen again. We need to talk up the Commandery, plan up the year, plan up each month, plan up each meeting. Having a carry-in potluck dinner before each meeting can help encourage participation. Plus, we need to maintain regular, informative communication with our members. The plans, calendars, and agendas need to be shared with the active members and, more importantly, with the silent majority of inactive members. We need to stop wasting our meetings because meaningless meetings waste everyone's time.

Playing with swords is a big part of Templary. Drilling can be fun, so shake it up. Organize several teams within your Commandery. You can have a Junior team of new members, an Officer team, and a Senior team of Past Commanders. You can hold your own drill competition events. You could even invite nearby Commanderies to participate.

However, there has to be more to Templary than just drilling, so mix it up. Practice/perform the full opening ritual, try out the short form on page 98 in the black book, or review/discuss the opening rituals for the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross and the Order of Malta. Practice/confer the Orders one per meeting instead of using festivals. Provide educational presentations and discussions on historic Templary, modern Knights Templary, elements of the ritual work, and leadership. The bottom line is that we must maintain a positive attitude and stay personally excited, because excitement is contagious. Motivating a Commandery involves changing attitudes and opinions.

There is no cookie cutter solution or formula for motivating and leading a Commandery. A Commandery is not an object that can be tested, analyzed, diagnosed, and repaired. It is a collection of Sir Knights, of individuals working together in a common cause, and each Commandery has a dynamic character unique to that collective. Let's all help our new Commanders succeed and in turn help our Commanderies to grow and prosper.
