Ward, PMEGHP that New York isn't the only state to accomplish such. I was unaware that in 1987 Gainesville Commandery hosted candidates from throughout the state, where they knighted 107 in one day. He states the work was perfectly done, without prompters, from complete memory, with nothing being skipped nor eliminated. Sir Knight George Chipouras, PREGC conferred the Order of the Temple and knighted each man himself. It took 13 or 14 hours to complete the ceremony. The order of the Temple was conferred at R.T. Schafer Lodge No. 350. There was standing room only with over 250 in attendance. Since receiving this information I spoke to S. K. Marvin Gerhard, PREGC, and this isn't the only time that 100+ have been knighted in one day in Florida. To quote Sir Knight Harvey "Florida does not take a back seat to anyone and Excellence is the key word." As I said before who is going to take up the sword and do it again?

Sir Knights, this is our history and I believe it needs to be documented, not solely for the Commandery, but for all our York Rite Bodies. Now a bit of history for your reading pleasure. Have you ever wondered how we as Knights Templar went from the uniform they wore during the Crusades to the Class "A" uniform we wear today. The white mantle they wore was said to be a symbol of purity and a reflection of the Knight's vow of chastity.
