Grand Prelate's Corner

May 21, 2020 is Ascension Day. What do Christians believe about Ascension? Well, Ascension is the belief of the living Christ returning into heaven on the 40th day after his Resurrection (Easter being reckoned as the first day). Ascension ranks with Christmas, Easter and Pentecost in the universality of its observance among Christians.

The Bible says that on Mt. Olivet Jesus promised the disciples that they would soon receive the Holy Spirit and asked them to remain in Jerusalem until the Spirit had come. As he blessed them he began to ascend into heaven to take his seat at the right hand of God. Jesus' ascension into heaven is significant as it shows that he has returned to Heaven after completing his mission on Earth. Christians believe that Jesus is in Heaven with God, until He decides to send Jesus to Earth for the final judgment.

The Gospel of John states in Jesus' own words: "No one has ascended into heaven but he who descended from heaven, the son of man." (John 3:13) For us as Christians, the Ascension marks the coronation day of Christ in Heaven, as King of All. He has been given all authority in heaven and on earth and is seated at the right hand of the Father (Ephesians 1:20-22). Because He has ascended, we have an advocate with the Father who never stops interceding for us (1 John 2:1, Rom 8:34). The Ascension is the moment where Christ – the second Adam, in all his physical, bodily humanity, returns to the presence of God. It is the beginning of the reversal of the fall—man bodily dwelling again with God.

Christ, our representative, is the firstborn from the dead (Col 1:18) and His glorious return to heaven paves the way for a reborn humanity. So the ascended Christ keeps the doorway to heaven open for all of us fallen human beings to being right with God now by faith in his death, resurrection and ascension. The Ascension reminds us that Christianity is not only an historical faith, but a faith of the present and future. Jesus is, right now, in glorified humanity on the throne of the universe, wielding as the God-man "all authority in heaven and on earth" (Matthew 28:18).

He is not just our suffering servant who came and died and rose triumphant, but our actively ruling, actively conquering king." So, Sir Knights take the time to celebrate Ascension Day for it recognizes who is the true Commander of our lives.
