Easter 2021 Article for the Knight Templar magazine 1/31/2021

As many of you know, I taught at UW Oshkosh for 17 years before retiring. My articles may have a distinct approach and humor that you should find tolerable, if not amusing at times.

We all know the Easter story as it unfolds in our Bibles and in our Asylums. We also know about the Easter bunny; that cute, fluffy, furry (flea infested) animal that brings us Easter eggs and goodies. But did you know....the first Christians followed the Biblical Hebrew calendar and timed the observance of Easter in relation to the date of the Jewish Passover. The First Council of Nicaea (325 A.D.) established what we observe today. In his book, titled The Unsung Heroes of Easter, Daniel Whyte III tells us the stories of eight (8) Biblical figures relegated to "minor" roles-yet each had profound effects of what we now call Easter. And then all at once, something was born in him, a spark of faith and he exclaims, "Truly this was a Son of God." *Joseph of Arimathea, a "secret believer", gave his newly dug tomb to Jesus for burial. This shows great love and great courage. *Nicodemus, a member of the Pharisees and of the Jewish Council (Sanhedrin) stood up for Jesus when all else was conspiring against him (Jesus). [John3:1-21]

As you can see, we all play a role in this life on earth. Some of us play a larger role than others, yet those lesser roles are just as significant. Where will history measure you on that continuum?
