To honor this legend the Ukrainian people often use plastic spiders and webs to decorate their trees.

Throw a Shoe - Czech Republic

On Christmas Day, single women throw shoes over their shoulders towards the front door of the home. If the shoe lands with the toe pointing towards the door, the lady will marry within the year, but if the heel faces the door, she will remain single for another year.

KFC Christmas Feast – Japan

Christmas is not a national holiday in Japan but due to a crazy marketing campaign the Japanese folks have a unique version of Christmas Eve dinner. Turkey isn't a common food item in Japan, so KFC marketed its chicken as a traditional meal for the holidays. Over the years the idea has caught on and become a holiday tradition.

My Message to the Sir Knights and their Families this Christmas Season.... is the message of "LOVE", and I will be presenting it through a little Christmas symbolism.

The Poinsettia

The reason we associate poinsettias with the holidays comes from an old Mexican legend. A young girl named Pepita was sad that she didn't have a gift to leave for the baby Jesus at Christmas Eve services. Her cousin tried to comfort her and said that Jesus would love any present from her, even the smallest one. With no money to buy a real gift, Pepita picked a bouquet of weeds that she walked past on the way to church. (Other versions of the story say an angel came to her and instructed her to pick the plants.) When she got there, she left the weeds at the bottom of the nativity scene. All of a sudden, the weeds transformed into beautiful red flowers. The shape of the poinsettia flower and leaves are sometimes thought as a symbol of the "Star of Bethlehem which led the Wise Men to JESUS. The red colored leaves symbolize the blood of Christ. The white leaves represent Christ' purity. While the green leaves and stems remind the faithful of Jesus being compared to the Vine that brings us essential growth, spiritual nourishment, and Everlasting life.

This is why Christmas colors are red, white, and green.

We can all learn a lesson from this young girl. We need to constantly show our God the LOVE that he has shown us by sending His Son Jesus to bear the sins of all.
