Another area of focus is on our youth. There are pockets of active Masonic youth organizations in the state that I believe we can more actively support. But not just our Masonic youth. What can we do to promote ourselves and our values to others that don't know who we are or what we stand for? I've heard of examples of flag presentations at high school football and basketball games, for example. How powerful could it be to have the Flag Lecture recited in a public setting before the National Anthem?

My program this year remains largely unchanged, with the detail that I believe it is achievable, since we are able to meet, unlike the first 6 months of my term last year. The general gist of it is: I want us all to become more active, both within our local Commanderies and in our communities. We have a great story to tell, and a great message for the world!

Ex nihilo nihil fit – from nothing comes nothing. In this spirit, I look forward to working with all of you in spreading our great story to the world.
