### THAT WE MAY BE ONE IN THE LORD

Reverend William Arnot (1808–1875) was a Scottish minister and theological writer. One of the books that he wrote was "Lesser Parables of Our Lord," originally published, London, by T. Nelson, in 1884. In the Chapter entitled "The Salt of the Earth," on page 253, Arnot said, "He gives what he demands, and demands what he gives. The same master both gives the talents and requires an account of their outlay." This is a wonderful expression about God's design and the part we play as His creation. In John 13:34-35 (NIV), Jesus said, "A new command I give you: Love one another. As I have loved you, so you must love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you love one another."
