The Grand York Rite depends on those York Rite members of the different communities throughout Kansas to make that contact. We, as officers of the different bodies should place more emphasis on our support of those who are dedicated to their local bodies, and communities and Blue Lodges where our new members are obtained.

By this analysis, my conclusion is to support with all that is available to me as Grand Commander of the Grand York rite of Kansas. I can do that by making as my visits and give encouragement and support to that ONE who is dedicated to the order.
