Grand Prelate's Corner

May God be gracious to us and bless us and make his face shine on us, so that your ways may be known on earth, your salvation among all nations. (Psalm 67:1,2)

The Apostle Paul tells his readers to "Let the word of Christ dwell in you richly, as you teach and admonish one another in all wisdom, and as you sing psalms and hymns and spiritual songs with thankfulness in your hearts to God" (Colossians 3:16). It's a reminder to live the life of a Christian in a state of continual thanksgiving towards God. Elsewhere, he calls us to "Rejoice always, pray constantly, give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you" (1 Thessalonians 5:16-18).

But what does that look like, and why is it important? It's easy to praise God in the good times, but how do we praise Him in times of suffering or temptation—and why should we? We're thankful, because of God's steadfast love for us. It's a love that we don't have to (and can't) earn, and unlike the fleeting human loves we know here on earth, it's steadfast, it's reliable. We have a God we can lean on, whose strength is inseparable from His love. So the first answer to why we should thank God is that He lovingly created us, and He loves us still, because His love is steadfast. That's a cause for great joy.

There is another reason for our thanksgiving as King David states in I Chronicles 16:8-9, "I will give thanks to thee, O Lord, among the peoples; I will sing praises to thee among the nations." In other words, we should go out "to the nations," to the world, proclaiming the good things that God has done: in creation and in salvation, and in a special way in our own lives. This call to evangelize through thanksgiving is perhaps nowhere more applicable than the modern age. We have little time for logical argument, but we love sympathetic stories. If you can share how God has changed your life, that's a powerful witness. And the more you spend time in thanksgiving for God, the more you're able to share "to the nations" just what it is that you're thankful for.

If we love Christ, who offers himself for us, we should feel compelled to find a few minutes to express that to another. And so we can see that the Christian message is one of constant thankfulness to God, and that this is how we should approach our daily living, whether in times of great celebration or great difficulty—and there is a very real sense in which the thankful are the ones who shall be saved. God promises in Psalm 50:23, "He who brings thanksgiving as his sacrifice honors me; to him who orders his way aright I will show the salvation of God!"
