If we have not, then we are neglecting those we love and hold so dearly in this corporeal life. This communication is to ask you to take a moment and consider those Masonic items you and your spouse

may have not covered before they have to ask for help from a brother Mason regarding their disposition. It has come to my doorstep several times and caused me to bring it to your thoughts as well.

On the next page are several items to talk to your spouse and family about. Every decision is predicated upon your family and not the Grand Commandery or other group you belong to. It is merely a reminder to clarify your final wishes and keep things as you wish them to occur when the door to immortality opens for you in focus with your loved ones. Please review the questions and talk to your family. Possibly use this as a way to broach the uncomfortable issue we all wish to avoid.



Thank you for your review and help us give the proper respect to your wishes for your Masonic materials at the time of your travel to the house not built with hands, eternal in the Heavens above.

Sir Knights I leave these items below as decision points and discussion items for you and your family. Thank you for your attention to your loved ones, their potential confusion and time of grief at your eventual loss.

- 1) Do you have a will and or trust already in place?
- 2) Have you discussed this with your family, and do they know where the documents are?
- 3) Is a copy filed with your attorney or in a safe and secure (non-burnable and or water safe) place?
- 4) Do you have a current Masonic resume that can be used at your funeral if you desire this type of service?
- 5) Have you discussed with your family the type of Masonic, York Rite, Templar, or other arrangements you desire? And have you made these wishes known to your Commandery or other York Rite bodies? Have you requested a specific brother to do that ceremony?
- 6) Do they know what you wanted to become of your Masonic educational papers, books, files, aprons, and other memorabilia?
- 7) Do you have any items that the Grand bodies have allowed you to borrow, Past Grand jewels, essentials, ritual books or other items such as minutes, financial statements for your organizations that need to be returned to the bodies?
- 8) What do you want to happen to those colorful jackets and other articles of clothing and appointments such as shoulder cords, belts, slings, swords, and chapeaux's that the family may want to remember you by or not know how or why they were important to you? Do you want them gifted to the Commandery you belonged to, placed on eBay, or kept as mementos by a favored child in your family? Several widows have asked me personally what to do with things so personal to a revered Sir Knight that I could only ask them what they wanted to do here. There were in a few cases closets full of materials they no longer needed but did not want to go to disuse.
- 9) Does your Commandery, or other fraternal body, have someone that can help with your items you may wish to donate for further Masonic use by a new or insufficiently clad brother?

These are but a few of the considerations I have had to respond to in the wake of the loss of brothers in the past three years. Please consider your family and their confusion at the great vacuum you may leave them when you find your way back to that eternal home to which we all must go.
