GRAND COMMANDER'S MESSAGE

Greetings Sir Knights,

As I pen this message, the news about the COVID-19 pandemic is again looking serious. We all thought that with the wide-spread availability of three COVID-19 vaccines that we would be turning the corner on the pandemic in July. However, vaccine hesitancy is beginning to catch up with many Missouri communities.

I live in Madison County and our County Health Department is asking the residents of the County to take the following measures to protect against COVID-19 Delta Variant exposure even if a person is fully vaccinated.

First, stay home and consult with your family doctor if you are ill.

Second, wear a face covering (mouth and nose) when you are visiting with elderly or immunocompromised persons.

Third, when indoors maintain a social distance of at least 6 feet and wear a face covering if you are unable to socially distance.

And fourth, Consider Getting Vaccinated!

Sir Knights, I know that I have been pushing our Commanderies to move up to reopening status Phase Two, so we can all return to normal Commandery operations including the conferral of the Orders and Drill Practice. However, protecting ourselves from the COVID-19 Delta Variant must be our top priority right now. The 2021-2022 Grand Commandery General Order No. 2 that I issued on June 14, 2021, provides instructions for both moving up in reopening status as well as moving down in reopening status. It may be necessary, due to the seriousness of the health issues that we are experiencing, to vote to move from Phase Two back down to Phase One (restricted in person meetings) or even back down to Phase Zero (virtual meetings). Just like when your Commandery voted one month to move up to a new reopening status the following month, your Commandery can vote one month to move down to a previous reopening status. The requirements and procedures explained in General Order No. 2 work both ways - moving up in reopening status or moving down in reopening status.

I sincerely encourage all Sir Knights to strongly consider getting vaccinated as soon as possible. I hope and pray that all of you will stay safe and remain

healthy. I look forward to seeing some of you at the 200th Annual Communication of the Grand Lodge of Missouri on September 27th and 28th.
