## What is Truth?

In the Illustrious Order of the Red Cross, Zerubbabel is questioned about who is the strongest. Zerubbabel's response was one which surprised everyone at the assemblage and earned him the accolades of King Darius. Zerubbabel expounded upon the virtues of truth. According to Zerubbabel truth is unchangeable and everlasting. Truth is mightier than any other thing in existence.

Zerubbabel's interpretation of truth is important for understanding the essence of God. He states in his discourse to Darius that God is

the God of truth. As a Christian we must understand the deep meaning behind this statement. God, and His word, are the essence of truth for the world. It matters little what people may think of the scriptures. The Word of God is the truth which a hurting world still needs over 2,000 years later. Zerubbabel was before the time period of the coming birth of Christ, yet he understood all things pass away over time. The king will change his mind. New kings will be raised. Fortunes will be won and subsequently lost. People are born and thus must die. But the word of God continues to be true and will be true forever.

Albert Mackey attempted to define truth in his masonic dictionary. According to Mackey, truth is the real object of freemasonry, and it is the search for the philosophical and religious truth we endeavor to find through our search for light in Masonry (Mackey, 1918, p. 805). Whenever we as Masons engage in the search for light, or God, we are also seeking after the truth because God is truth. The rituals of freemasonry change slightly over time and from jurisdiction to jurisdiction. While there may be changes in some parts of the ritual what does not change is the intent behind the ritual. Freemasonry teaches the search for the truth. Mackey continued and stated, "the higher ideas of truth which pervades the whole Masonic system, and which is symbolized by the Word, is that which is properly expressed to a knowledge of God." (Mackey, 1918, p. 805). Mackey understood the search for all things regarding Masonry is inevitably the search for truth which occurs only be seeking the face of God. The truth will always prevail because it is greater than all the earthly principalities and their beliefs. Truth does not change and it will always prevail over lies.

As Knight Templars we understand the continuing search for truth. Our entire order is founded upon a belief in the Word of God. We use exclusively the New Testament in our rituals. This is not only the Word of God, but it explains the Word being made into flesh to dwell among us and to forgive us our sins. We use the Lord's Prayer throughout our rituals to remind us of the teachings of Christ. We understand truth.
