BENTON HARBOR, Mich. — Sir Knight Ronald "Ron" Tungett, 82, Benton Harbor, died July 19, 2022 at Hanson Hospice Center in Stevensville. Tungett served as Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, Knights Templar, 1982-83.


Ron was born Dec. 4, 1939, in Kansas City, Mo., to Leslie and Ruth (Whittaker) Tungett.

He graduated from Northeast High School in Kansas City. Ron served his country in the U.S. Navy from Aug. 21, 1961 to Aug. 20, 1967.

On Feb. 23, 1963, he married Patricia Slough in San Diego. Ron worked as an I.T. manager for multiple businesses in Indiana and Michigan. Ron earned his Eagle Scout rank as a young man and served many years as a Scout Master in Indiana and Michigan. He also was an active member of Stevensville United Methodist Church.

Tungett held many offices in the various branches of the Masonic Fraternity in both Indiana and Illinois, and had been coroneted a 33rd Degree Scottish Rite Mason in the Northern Masonic Jurisdiction.

Grand Officers' Monthly Column

A Templar Wedding and Preserving Masonic Facilities

That headline sounds quite similar to the title of Stephen King's short story, Rita Hayworth and Shawshank Redemption, which became the basis for the award-winning movie, Shawshank Redemption. While this column has to do with Masonic facilities in Indiana rather than with a penitentiary in Maine, we all romantically hope that a marriage is a life sentence.

In the March, 2019, edition of what was then the Indiana Supplement to the *Knight Templar Magazine*, I wrote of the Knight Templar wedding of Sir Knight Joseph and Lady Tracy Sparks. Sparks is currently Grand Captain General of the Grand Commandery Knights Templar of Indiana. Grand Commander Phil Whisner gave Sparks responsibility for this month's Grand Officer column. Thus, Sparks and I had several conversations about what he could do. Knowing about his Knight Templar wedding, I suggested that topic, because it was one he knew well, and I had never heard of another. But although that 2019 story contained a lot of "what," there was little "why." And I love "why." In the meantime, I had seen short mentions of Crawfords-ville's Masonic Cornerstone in the *Indiana Freemason*, but really didn't know much of that story.

You probably know about the name change of the Indiana Masonic Home to Compass Park, but you probably haven't heard about The Masonic Cornerstone in Crawfordsville. Each change is an attempt to preserve Masonic facilities in a changing world. By expanding the number of people in the market for the services each provides by offering them to the general public beyond the members of Freemasonry, those in charge hope to spread the cost of operation and improvement across many more people.

Joe Sparks, a union pipefitter, lives south of Crawfordsville, but works 12 hours a day maintaining the Evonik chemicals plant in Lafayette. But despite those hours, if he falls in love with something, he becomes totally involved. Thus, it should be no surprise that he, 1, married Lady Tracy, 2, in a Knight Templar service, in 3, a Masonic Temple.

"It all begins with Masonry" Sparks said. "After I became a Master Mason in 2009, in Montgomery Lodge No. 50. I wanted to join the officer line, and I served as Worshipful Master in 2012, and again in 2013. I was seeking more light and sought a petition to join York Rite. I started my York Rite journey in 2015 but, due to work, was not able to be knighted until 2016, in Crawfordsville Commandery No. 25."

Sparks became Eminent Commander in 2019. He soon became a Deputy Battalion Commander, then was appointed Grand Warder and has progressed up the line.

In the meantime, it had been decided the way to provide for funding for preservation and improvement of the Crawfordsville Masonic Temple was to invite members of the public to use its facilities as an events venue, create a foundation to accept ownership with a 16-member board, only four of which are Masons, and then obtain a 501(C)3 organizational status from the Internal Revenue Service. The latter makes it eligible to apply for grants and other types of outside funding. Given that new status and a prominent location on a downtown Crawfordsville corner, the structure is now known as the Crawfordsville Masonic Cornerstone.

"It's still a Masonic Temple, but the Masonic organizations pay rent to the foundation to use the Temple," Sparks said. "Our ultimate goal is to restore and upgrade the building."

Back in 2019, SK Joe and Lady Tracy were planning their wedding and needed a venue. But, as always, price was a consideration.

"The Crawfordsville Temple is a beautiful temple, and, at that time members could use it for free, but only once, and that would save us money," Sparks said. "My wife has always been very supportive of my Masonic endeavor and understands the importance of the fraternity to me. Plus it helped promote the Temple by using it as our wedding venue."

SK Steven Kromann, who was then Grand Photographer, gave the couple the idea of a Templar wedding. "We liked the uniqueness," Sparks said. "It was new, but it also was something involving the fraternity."

It took place in the temple's ballroom/dining room, and about 70 people attended. Dozens of Sir Knights appeared in full uniform, including SK Terry Kehrer, Grand Commander of the Grand Commandery of Indiana, and SK Duane Vaught, Grand Master of the Grand Encampment Knights Templar of the United States of America.

SK Randal Ellington, a Grand Prelate Emeritus and currently the Deputy Grand Commander of Indiana, officiated.

The Knights formed double lines from the hallway into the room, with Lady Tracy waiting in that hallway while Ellington made Sparks kneel and take an extra vow upon himself,

"One of the things my wife really enjoyed was that Randy had me kneel and take an oath to 'signify that you are worthy of taking Lady Tracy's hand." Sparks said.

Lady Tracy was then passed under an arch of steel, escorted through the lines by GM Vaught and followed by GC Kehrer.

Lady Tracy's sons, then age 25 and 21, met her at the head of the lines and escorted her to the altar, giving the bride away, Sparks said.

And thus, SK Joseph and Lady Tracy became husband and wife, in a Temple ballroom surrounded by many Sir Knights in uniform, a venue in which many more couples – Masonic or not – may join together in the future, in a building hopefully financially preserved indefinitely by the changes made, of which I learned when I asked SK Joe Sparks to tell me about his wedding.
