Happy New Year Sir Knights of Illinois,

Each Commandery is hereby charged to have their Membership Committee and any interested Sir Knight, attempt to make personal contact with the suspended Sir Knight, see if they are having difficulties in their live, lost interest, moved, have a complaint, etc. that maybe at the root cause of the suspension. Dues can be remitted if a request is made for financial hardship, Interest can be peaked with good communications, Complaints can be addressed when communicated. The Commanderies have made an investment in each Sir Knight and warrants an additional payment of time and effort to not throw the investment away. (If a Commandery has difficulty covering the dues of members who are on hard times they can apply to IKTOA our Grand Commandery Charity for assistance in meeting this obligation.)

Now that the easy part is over, I challenge every Sir Knight to bring a petition for a new candidate this year. If we all find a worthy candidate, we be on our way to nearly double our membership and preserve our future. Recruitment is easy.
