NC Grand York Rite Hosts the 85th Annual Great Smokies Summer Assembly

Maggie Valley – The Grand York Rite of North Carolina is celebrating 200 years of York Rite Masonry in North Carolina this year, and there are many events planned for our annual Summer Assembly that Sir



Knights from all over the country are planning to attend. This will be the 85<sup>th</sup> Summer Assembly, and one of the landmark events of this year will be the unearthing of the Cryptic Deposit that was made in 1972 near the Masonic Marker at Black Camp Gap, which is just up the mountain from Maggie Valley.

This is the second such deposit laid here, as the 1972 even also dug up a previous deposit from the mid-1930s. In keeping with this tradition, a new deposit will be interred, for our brethren and Sir Knights of 2072 to recover. According to David Cashion, the 1972 deposit contains "Coins, Pins, Proceedings, Chapter Pennies, Small Booklets, Small Plaques, Jewels, Histories, Brochures, Masonic Talks, Delegate Badges for Triennials, Miniature Apron, Laminated Photos, Programs of Events, and a Small Holy Bible from the original deposit." SK Cashion is hard at work cataloging items that have been donated from all across the state for this year's deposit.

The festivities begin on Saturday, July 9, and conclude Tuesday, July 12. Registration is \$20 (men only) and attendees to both the Summer Assembly and the Banquet Monday night must complete their <a href="registration">registration</a> with payment by June 20 to the Grand Secretary.

## <u>District Schools of the Knight Scheduled</u> for 2022-23

Raleigh – Mark Alexander, Grand Instructor/Inspector for the Grand Commandery of NC has announced several district-level meetings for ritual instruction throughout the state. Starting in September and running through November there will be a School of the Knight instruction class presented for each district in NC at a host Body's stated communication. The Class will cover basic Instruction for Sword work, the full form opening, and basic ritual setup. The class will be taught from the newly approved NC Tactics

Manual. A link for this manual should be available soon. Commanderies are requested to order 10 copies each for their use when they become available.

The Class should last about an hour and a half. Commandery officers and Sir Knights from each Commandery in the scheduled districts are requested to attend and to bring your sword and belt and any extra swords that you may have in case we may need them. Full Class A Uniforms may be worn but are not required. The main goal is to come together and learn so our Rituals and Ceremonies may be presented with the dignity and grandeur they deserve and stop short forming just to get through them. The remaining three districts will be scheduled at the conclusion of the District Meetings. Sir Knight Alexander says, "My goal is to never see a Commandery 'declared' open again. We do not do it in Blue Lodge, so why do it in an Asylum?"

## **Paying Respects**

Salisbury – This Easter, I had the distinct honor of participating in the Easter Sunrise Service at the George Washington Masonic Memorial, and the laying of a wreath at the Tomb of the Unknown Soldiers, as part of the North Carolina Grand Commandery. As my fellow Sir Knights and I were leaving the Arlington Cemetery I stopped and placed a penny on a grave headstone. I did this a second time and my companions asked what I was doing, leaving pennies on the gravestones. I thought everyone knew of this custom, but apparently not. I told them it was a symbol of respect that someone, from somewhere, had taken time to pay their respects to the person resting in this hallowed soil. They appeared to be sincerely intrigued with this and asked for more information.

First a very brief history. Leaving coins with the deceased is not new: ancient Greeks and Romans left coins with their dead relatives, and comrades at arms, to pay the ferryman, Charon, the toll necessary to carry the soul across the river Styx. Even into the early twentieth century in parts of the United States, families would place coins over their loved one's eyes. So, this is technically not a new practice, but it has seen a resurgence since the end of the Vietnam War.

- A penny left on the headstone lets the deceased soldier's family and other members of the armed forces know you visited the final resting place and gave your respects.
- A nickel means you and the deceased veteran trained in boot camp together,
- A dime means you and the deceased veteran served in a unit, or theater of conflict together,
- A quarter means that the person leaving the coin was with the deceased soldier when they died. I thought this was especially interesting as George Washington was a Mason, and his profile appears on the quarter and the oldest medal awarded to a veteran, the Purple Heart.

The act of leaving coins was thought to be a less intrusive way for people to let the families know their departed loved one was still in the hearts of a thankful nation for the sacrifices they made. The act of leaving coins on headstones also carries over to non-military grave sites:

- A penny means you visited the site and remembered the person buried there,
- A nickel means you went to school with the deceased,
- A dime means you worked with the deceased,
- A quarter means you were with the person when they passed on.

Another tradition which might be found is the placing of pebbles and stones on the grave marker. This is a Hebrew custom known as "*matzevot*" and is revered because it symbolizes that this is a pious family who visits the grave of their loved ones.

You don't have to know the person to leave a coin. You're simply leaving a message that you stopped by and said thank you to the departed for their service, and to let others know they have not been forgotten, and that you said a prayer that the family may find peace. The coins left on the headstones are normally collected monthly and used to maintain the cemetery

grounds and assist in offsetting the cost of interring indigent veterans.

Why did I do this? It reminds me of something my late father told me when I was young. I asked my Dad why he had enlisted in the United States Marine Corps, and he replied, "So you won't have to."

As with most youth it took time for the meaning of his answer to sink in, but I think he was saying that like all members of the military, they serve with the hope that by their service of defending our freedom now, the children of tomorrow will hopefully not have to take up arms. So out of respect and gratitude I will continue to place pennies on the headstones of those resting veterans.
