However, what are you doing about it?

The Grand Commandery has noticed and because of it has implanted changes as to how we go about assessing commanderies. No longer are we using the top-down approach and assigning what you are to be evaluated on. That model wasn't working. It wasn't meeting your needs. We now have you deciding what areas to improve. Eminent Commanders, take this opportunity with the beginning of the new chivalric year to discuss with your Sir Knights what you as a commandery wish to improve and be inspected on. Define what you want to accomplish. Once you do, communicate this to your instructor and ultimately to your inspecting officer.

To bring this about, use a portion of your stated conclaves to work toward your plan or goal(s). If you do a little each conclave, you will see improvements and you will move toward, if not, reach your goals. I understand improvement doesn't happen overnight. It will take time and effort on everyone's part. However, when you put effort into your product, everyone will benefit from it. You will recruit more men, you will retain them, and you may even be able to bring some back.
