Thanks to the research and work at the Vision Center at the Children's Hospital in Los Angeles, she now has 20/60 vision, plays competitive soccer, has a blue belt in karate, and a bright future ahead of her.

The research and work at the Vision Center were possible thanks to the Knights Templar Eye Foundation. KTEF is the only foundation in the world exclusively devoted to childhood blindness. Whether you are 20, 40, 60, or 80, think about all you have been able to experience because of being able to see. Lady Connie and I have been blessed and fortunate to have experienced many of the wonders of God's world in our travels. What a different experience it would have been to not have been able to actually see the incredible waterfalls, blue skies, waves in the oceans, and majestic mountains that we have been able to visit. Or even worse, what if we had not been able to see the faces of each of our daughters and grandchildren as they were born?
