THE IDEA OF GIVING THANKS

In the United States we celebrate Thanksgiving Day each year on the 4th Thursday of November. It is a holiday begun by the early settlers to express their gratitude to God for a bountiful harvest. However, it is patterned after the Jewish Feast of the Tabernacles. In the fall, after each year's harvest, Israelites from all over the country would gather in Jerusalem for a week of celebration to commemorate the time God had spent with them in the wilderness and to give thanks for another good harvest.

The Pilgrims of New England, after surviving a very difficult year in the New World, instituted a similar, though much smaller, thanksgiving feast, again with the intent of praising God. In 1863, this event became a national holiday in the United States. However, it was not until 1941 that the 4th Thursday of November was codified as the official date of the observance.

On Thanksgiving day, we should also remember the Eucharist which is Greek for "thanksgiving." In the Holy Eucharist, God gives us His only Son. Jesus gives us His Body and His Blood in Holy Communion. God gives us everything in the Eucharist: divine grace, divine forgiveness, divine life, and divine love. We should, in some way great or small, celebrate the Eucharist each and every day. First and foremost we should give thanks for life itself. Life is precious and all too fleeting. And, life is all about love.

If you're looking for things for which to be thankful, then think about some of these blessings from the "God Without:" Love Without Limits, Forgiveness Without Question, Blessings Without Number, and Mercy Without Measure. May Our Eucharist Lord and Savior grant us the grace of always giving thanks for all that He bestows on us.
