Matthew 24:13 (NABRE) has recently been on my mind, "But the one who perseveres to the end will be saved." I found myself wondering just exactly what are the conditions of perseverance? Does it mean that you need to be the last man standing at the end – the final rat in the rat race? Or does it mean something else?

I believe that a hint can be found in the preceding verse of the Book of Matthew 24. Verse 12 (NABRE) states, "... and because of the increase of evildoing, the love of many will grow cold." However, the one who perseveres to the end will be saved.

Verse 12 not withstanding, I now find myself wondering about the scope of love required to meet this requirement. Just exactly what should my love encompass? Love of what, or of whom, or how much? With this question we reach the point of this article, "What is the breadth of love you need to keep hot in your heart in order to achieve perseverance as it is described in Matthew 24:13?"

I cannot answer this open ended question for you as it is a part of your individual pilgrimage, but the verses below have helped to guide me.

- Matthew 22:36-38 (NABRE): "Teacher, which commandment in the law is the greatest?" He said to him, "You shall love the Lord, your God, with all your heart, with all your soul, and with all your mind. This is the greatest and the first commandment."
- Matthew 10:37 (NABRE): "Whoever loves father or mother more than me is not worthy of me, and whoever loves son or daughter more than me is not worthy of me ..."
- Matthew 22:39 (NABRE): "The second is like it: You shall love your neighbor as yourself."
- Matthew 5:44 (NABRE): "But I say to you, love your enemies, and pray for those who
 persecute you, ..."

As your New Year begins, remember that you need to keep the fires of Love burning in your heart despite the multiplication of wickedness.

CHALLENGES FOR THE NEW YEAR

The New Year is upon us and many of us have made resolutions that we promise to keep in the New Year. However, we find those resolutions put aside rather soon. Let us determine to make this New Year different. Let us discuss some resolutions, or commitments, that will make a radical difference in our lives. There are four commitments that God in His Word encourages us to make. I challenge you to make these four commitments for this New Year.

No. 1: Commit Yourself to Forget Your Failures
