Faith

A Happy and Healthy New Year, Sir Knights;

Thoughts of a new year and the New Year's Eve celebration remind me of a memory of my childhood. My mother's mother, Nanny, came to live with us when I was young. She was a very strong minded Scottish woman and brought into our home many a Scottish Tradition. On New Year's Eve she taught our family about the Scottish tradition of "First Footing".

The Tradition of the First Footing is practiced by the first person to cross the threshold of your door in the new year—shortly after the "Ball" was dropped in Times Square. It is considered an honor to be someone's "First Footer" and particularly if one is a tall, dark, handsome male. The First Footer should bear gifts consisting of a lump of coal, bread and some coins—symbolizing basic needs for the family in the New Year (heat, food, and some money). We still practice the First Footing in our home on New Year's Eve and realize that we have a lot to be grateful for.

Continuing the opening theme for the year, "Faith" — God's word says that we are saved by grace. "It's through Faith in Christ Jesus and not by our own efforts or works." Ephesian 2:8-9. We are not saved by good works, but we are saved for good works. Those different prepositions make all the difference in the world. Good Works are evidence of salvation, not the cause of it. If there are no works or change of life to follow salvation, then it should be questioned whether the person or Knight is truly saved.

What are the good works of our Grand Commandery and our Constituent Commanderies? There are many. Here's an example:

Remember everything is in the plain English Ritual Book—you just have to read it.

Grand Prelate's Corner

The term Epiphany means "to show" or "to make known" or even "to reveal." It is the church season celebrated in the Western Christian Church, on January 6th, and lasts until the last Sunday before Ash Wednesday. It represents the manifestation of Christ to the Gentiles—the Gentile's Christmas. The main theme of Epiphany is— Jesus as the light of the world, revealed to all nations, including the Gentiles.

In Western churches, it reminds us of the coming of the wise ones bringing gifts to visit the Christ child, who by so doing "reveal" Jesus to the world as Lord and King. This act of worship by the Magi, which corresponded to Simeon's blessing that this child Jesus would be "a light for revelation to the Gentiles" (Luke 2:32), was one of the first indications that Jesus came for all people, of all nations, of all races and that the work of God in the world would not be limited to only a few.

The day is now observed as a time of focusing on the mission of the church in reaching others by "showing" Jesus as the Savior of all people. It fits with a new beginning—a new year that always arrives with all new possibilities, even that of forgiveness for all. It arrives as the Star in the sky which lights our way to the Christ Child. It's the star that teaches us the foolishness and futility of trying to find Jesus on our own. For God, does the revealing, the leading.

The Wise Men follow like little children. God does the teaching, the showing and the revealing. What is our star today? God's word. It's the star and teaches us that Jesus is the resurrection and life—the only way to heaven. You want peace and joy and purpose. You follow the star, Jesus. You want to know if God really loves you. You look around for a sign. The cross of Christ is your sign. He loves you. He died for you. You are precious to Him. The star teaches us the faithfulness of God.

We think of Abraham. God promised Him descendants as many as the stars in the sky. There were many stars in the OT. The Wise Men see one star, the one we've been longing for—Jesus, the Messiah. God has kept His promise. The star is here to show us our future with Jesus—heaven, paradise. We will shine like the sun. We will be lifted up and exalted, with a new body, no more death, no more sin, no more war. The star points us to the resurrection. Jesus the Christ is the Light of the World—may He shed his luster upon us all. Happy New Year—A blessed season of Light. Amen.
