Candle light Templar Luminaries Celebrate Christmas in Utica

The event was part of the Bicentennial Celebration of the founding of the organization on February 8, 1823 at the home of Richard Sanger—in what was then Whitestown (now New Hartford). The leader of that founding ceremony, and providing the authorizing signature for the new organization was DeWitt Clinton, who was the Grand Master of Knights Templar of New York.
