An ordained priest, he participated in the most notable legal attempt to clear the Knights Templar of any charges. De Bologna argued that torture could not have produced credible evidence. These defense efforts were met with fierce retribution. The Knights who went back on their testimonies (recanted) were burned at the stake as relapsed heretics.
