

who appears to be a bonified
Oriental Chair ... man. At a time
when Masonry really took off here in
the US.

The same person is responsible for recording the pronouncing guide for every proper name in the Bible, inclusive of 19th Century New York standards. Including the special names we don't always hear pronounced the same way... But occasionally wish we did. Is this not the work of an Oriental Chair ... man?

Worshipful Brother Samuel Wells Williams.

What other attributes may be relative to our chair in the East?
What are other associations with the chair of the Lodge have we yet to learn?

It seems an educationally perennial subject. This man played quite an amazing part. Thank goodness.

Fraternally yours, Sir Knight Eric Erfourth From 1848 to 1851 Williams was the editor of The Chinese Repository, a leading Western journal published in China. In 1853, he was attached to Commodore Matthew Calbraith Perry's expedition to Japan as an official interpreter.^[6]

In 1855, Williams was appointed Secretary of the United States Legation to China. During his stay in China, he wrote A Tonic Dictionary Of The Chinese Language In The Canton Dialect (英華分韻振要) in 1856. After years of opposition from the Chinese government, Williams was instrumental in the negotiation of the Treaty of Tientsin, which provided for the toleration of both Chinese and foreign Christians. In 1860, he was appointed chargé d'affaires for the United States in Beijing. He resigned his position on October 25, 1876, 43 years to the day that he first landed at Guangzhou in 1833. Around 1875, he completed a translation of the Book of Genesis and the Gospel of Matthew into Japanese, but the manuscripts were lost in a fire before they could be published. [5]
