Devotional: The Power of Honor

Scripture

Reading:

"Honor your father and mother." — Exodus 20:12 (NIV)

"Show proper respect to everyone, love the family of believers, fear God, honor the emperor." — 1 Peter 2:17 (NIV)

Honor is more than a polite gesture or a superficial form of respect; it is a deep, heartfelt acknowledgment of the worth and value of others. In a world where values can often be fleeting and superficial, the call to honor is both a countercultural and foundational principle of the Christian life. The Bible speaks extensively about honor, beginning with the Ten Commandments, where honoring our parents is given as a directive from God.
