Labor Day is a federal holiday celebrated on the first Monday of September every year. It observes and honors the American labor movement and pays tribute to the social and economic contribution of the workforce toward society in general and recognizes individual worker's rights. Patriot Day, also known as the National Day of Service and Remembrance, is observed on September 11th each year. Owing to its significance, many simply refer to Patriot Day by its date: September 11th, or 9/11. As you may recall, on Tuesday, September 11, 2001, 19 Islamist extremists hijacked 4 planes in a series of attacks orchestrated by Al-Qaeda, resulting in 2,977 people being killed and thousands more being injured. Among those killed were hundreds of police officers and firefighters carrying out rescue efforts. Given the opportunity, join us at the Flight 93 Memorial in Shanksville to honor those who lost their lives on that day.

Wife Appreciation Day, also sometimes known as National Wife Day, is celebrated every year on the third Sunday of September. It is a day for fortunate spouses to show their wives how important they are, and how they make their lives better. Our wives are the pillars of the family and are always the first to help and support us, as they often have to be strong for everyone. If possible, show your wife or significant woman in your life that she is appreciated every day in every way.

Constitution Day as well as Citizenship Day is observed every year on September 17th. September 17 to 23 is officially designated Constitution Week. It is a period of celebration, and appreciation, and allows citizens to learn more about their rights and responsibilities. Constitution Day commemorates the formation of the United States Constitution which was signed by 39 out of 55 delegates at the Constitutional Convention in Philadelphia on September 17th, 1787.

National POW/MIA Recognition Day is a day of observance that honors those who were prisoners of war (POW) as well as those who are still missing in action (MIA). It is observed here in the United States on the third Friday in September which is Friday, September 20, 2024. Take a moment to reflect on the service and sacrifices all of our veterans and active military have made, especially those who have still not returned home.

On the fourth Monday of September, (September 23, 2024) every year National Family Day is observed. It is a day for families to spend quality time together, share a meal to talk about their days and their lives so that they can support each other, and become closer. Our families support us in so many ways and deserve our attention and appreciation every day.

Associate Grand Prelate's Message

To all valiant knights of Pennsylvania wherever dispersed:

From the Gospel according to St. John in the 3rd chapter: Jesus said to Nicodemus: "No one has gone up to heaven except the one who has come down from heaven, the Son of Man. And just as Moses lifted up the serpent in the desert, so must the Son of Man be lifted up, so that everyone who believes in him may have eternal life." For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life. For God did not send his Son into the world to condemn the world, but that the world might be saved through him.

The month of September (14th) holds one of my favorite feasts of the church year: The Exaltation of the Holy Cross. This important feast of the church commemorates for us the cross itself, the very sign of our salvation, and for all valiant and magnanimous knights the sign we wear! The feast, known throughout the church as The Triumph of the Cross, or Holy Cross Day, or Holy Rood Day, causes us to remember three significant events of history. First, the finding of the true cross attributed to Saint Helena (the mother of Emperor Constantine), the dedication day of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre on Mount Calvary, and the return of the true cross to Jerusalem in AD 629.

Around the year AD327 excavations were being made to discover the true location of Calvary and to lay the foundation of the Church of the Holy Sepulchre which remains the honored site of the crucifixion, the preparation of the body of Our Lord, and the Edicule which covers the burial shelf of Jesus. This structure may well be the most sacred place for Christians. I've included a photo here from the last KT Holy Land Pilgrimage I led. Within the structure of the church, spanning several stories, you can walk to the lowest level of the ancient cistern where St. Helena claims to have found the true cross, and to the highest levels containing the rock of Mount Calvary. Another photo here included is the marking spot at that lowest level of the church.





As we contemplate the symbolism of the cross, and the centuries of pilgrims who have gone to that very spot to venerate that cross, let us all remember our connection to it, and the value it has imparted on us. By being lifted up on that instrument of cruelty and death, our savior Jesus Christ won for us the victory over sin and death. Through faith we gaze upon his body hanging on the cross we gain the assurance of this pardon, this remission of sin, this promise of life eternal in a paradise prepared for His people. So, like the thief on the cross next to Jesus, let us too ask with profound faith "Jesus, remember me when you come into your Kingdom!"

Lift high that great symbol of our salvation and worship him who upon that tree gained for all flesh redemption. Nothing of this world can destroy us, because those words recorded by John are most true, that He came into the world that we would be saved through him!
