Participating in a Christmas Observance is one of our most important obligations. I am grateful the Grand Commandery of New York has an annual program that allows all Sir Knights to celebrate together.

Although we are now in the New Year of 2025 per our calendar, the Feast of Christmas that started on Christmas Eve afternoon and continues until the Epiphany on January 6, actually continues through Candlemas on February 2. This will be followed by the presentation of the new Membership Initiative and the Revised Templar Boot Camp PowerPoint. We will also have an opportunity to discuss our charities and enhancements to our membership and marketing program.

After lunch we will have a tutorial on the three Templar Orders, focusing primarily on the Order of the Temple. This will be a wonderful day of education and fraternal friendship.

The new Membership Initiative was proposed by Sir Knight Ronald Brown, HPGC, KCT, in recognition of our decreasing membership. The core principle is to encourage all Commanderies to increase their MMS reported membership by at least 5% during the period of September 2024-September 2025. This 5% Growth Initiative is a powerful method that is easy to grasp when you consider that a Commandery with 30 members is only required to increase by two members during the Templar year.

This initiative has been embraced by the Trustees and success in growth will be incentivized by a monetary award to each successful Commandery at the 2025 Annual Conclave. This concept has worked on the Zone level in New York and in other Masonic bodies. I have no doubt this concept that will be enhanced by the excitement resulting from the new educational tools presented at the Symposium will also be successful on the State level.

And now, may "the God of **hope** fill you with all joy and peace and believing that ye may abound in **hope**, through the power of the Holy Spirit," (Romans 15:13). Lady Lynn and I wish you a year filled with peace, prosperity, and love.
