January Message from the Grand Commander

Sir Knights,

I hope you had a wonderful Christmas, and I wish you the best new year.

We constituted two new Commanderies in 2024. While studying the constitution ceremony, I learned something interesting. At one point in the ceremony, after the Grand Commander constitutes the new Commandery, he asks the Grand Prelate to pronounce words of dedication. The Grand Prelate then begins: "To our Most Eminent and Worthy Patron, St. John the Almoner, I do solemnly dedicate this Commandery..."

As Freemasons, we are used to having our Lodges dedicated to St. John the Baptist and St. John the Evangelist. In the Order of Malta, we receive a new member "in the name of St. John the Baptist, the patron Saint of the Order." So, who is St. John the Almoner, and why is he the Patron of the Masonic Knights Templar?

John the Merciful, also known as John the Almoner, lived around 560-620. He was born and died in Cyprus, but served as Patriarch of Alexandria in Egypt from 606 to 616. He is said to have built sixty-three new churches, cared for the poor in Alexandria, visited hospitals, and freed slaves. When the Persians attacked Jerusalem in 614, John sent relief to the Christian refugees.

One interesting story from John's time is that he protected and refused to punish Vitalis of Gaza for appearing to patronize prostitutes. Vitalis came to Alexandria at age sixty, where he learned the identity of every prostitute in the city. He would work during the day and at night take most of his wages to one of the prostitutes, paying her to remain chaste. Many prostitutes were converted because of his work. A man of the city killed him because of his suspected consorting with the prostitutes. Only after his death did the nature of his charitable work become known.

John the Merciful was the original patron of the Knights Hospitallers, or Knights of Malta. He probably became associated with the Masonic Templars when the Knights of Malta did, and it is likely because of his assistance to the Christian refugees of Jerusalem.

The feast of John the Merciful is on January 23. That of Vitalis is on January 11. Take some time to learn about and meditate on the charitable actions of these men. They encourage us to persist in charity, even to think out of the box about how to do it. Let us make this a great year for Templary!

Please make your plans to attend our Grand Conclave in March. Also, do not forget that we are going to have some pageantry. I want every Commandery to bring its Beauceant and a stand for it. We are going to process in with the Beauceants and line them up across the west of the Asylum. It will be impressive.

The Final Words

Last month, I spoke to you about the importance of a common understanding of the meanings of some of the words that we use when communicating with each other as Templars. They were words that we use as we work together as a team to accomplish our mission. If you do not know what our mission is, you can find it printed elsewhere in this newsletter. If you do not know what our mission is, it will be impossible for you to assist as a team member, a soldier of the cross, to accomplish it. Last month, I offered expanded definitions of the words "Morality," "Integrity," and "Character." This month, I would like to begin with a discussion of the word "Trust."

There are two distinctly different kinds of trust. If we are to succeed while working together as a team and especially as a military unit, we must trust each other with both kinds. The first is to trust someone's character. We defined character last month, and as Freemasons, we should, by definition, have high character. As an example, if I were to ask you to lend me \$20, and promised to repay you, I have little doubt that most of you would agree to do so, whether you were personally acquainted with me or not, based on the fact that you know that I am a Freemason and as a result, infer that I have high character and am therefore "Trustworthy."

The other kind of trust has to do with competency. As an example, let us suppose that you had been diagnosed with a potentially deadly but operable brain tumor and that the cost of the surgery necessary to cure you was in excess of \$500,000. If you know me, it should be obvious to you that I am not a brain surgeon, I am an engineer. Suppose I offered to remove the tumor for you at a cost of just \$50. I sincerely hope that you would not trust me to do so. This means that you do not trust my competency to do the work. So, the two kinds of trust are trust in character and trust in competency. My incompetency in brain surgery does not make me a bad person or a stupid person, just an ignorant person. This brings me to the next word of interest, "**Ignorance.**"

I have just admitted that I am ignorant about the finer points of brain surgery. This does not embarrass me because I know that I am ignorant about many subjects. Indeed, I believe that we are all born ignorant about just about everything and then spend the rest of our lives learning about those things we are interested in, those things that are important to us. When I was a young boy, it was common for us to try to insult each other by calling each other ignorant. Then as I matured, I discovered that as human beings, we are all ignorant, just about different subjects. This is one of the

main reasons we form and work together as teams, so that we can pool our talents and minimize the "ignorance" of the team and enhance our chances of accomplishing our shared mission.

The next definition I would like to offer is one for the word "**Humility**." This is a commonly misunderstood word, which often results in miscommunication. We tend to associate this word with low self-esteem, the opposite of self-confidence. The definition I offer is one of "teachability," the attitude that we know that we are ignorant of many subjects and that we still have much to learn in our life's journey. It is the opposite of the word "**Arrogance**." Arrogance is the idea that we have nothing left to learn, that we have essentially conquered ignorance. Humility is another essential trait of both a Knight and of a leader.

If you combine ignorance (which we all are) with arrogance, then we get "**Stupidity**." If, on the other hand, we combine our ignorance with humility, then we achieve the beginnings of true "**Wisdom**." Wisdom is something that we should all be seeking to achieve, as it is something which allows us to work together as Christian soldiers. It is crucial because it allows us to accomplish our mission as Templars. Wisdom helps us to achieve our best destiny as human beings, as poor and weary pilgrims traveling this path which leads to the rewards promised by our Redeemer and to our happiness while here on earth.

I hope that you will see fit to join your fellow Templars by actively engaging in the activities of your Commandery while we all press forward to the accomplishment of our mission. We need your competence to offset our ignorance, and we also need your efforts to accomplish our mission. I hope that you will re-join us as active members of your Commandery, as we enter this new era in the life of our order of modern Templary. 

How Far Will You Go?

Luke 2:15- After that, the angels went away and returned to heaven. Then the shepherds said to each other, 'We should leave the sheep and go to Bethlehem immediately! The Lord God has sent his angels to tell us what has happened. We want to see this baby.'

Matthew 2:1- Now when Jesus was born in Bethlehem of Judaea in the days of Herod the king, behold, there came wise men from the east to Jerusalem.

The shepherds not only left their post guarding their sheep, but they also could have potentially given up their livelihood. In biblical times, the sole possession of some shepherds was their flocks, which is why it is so important to note that these shepherds put their flock in jeopardy just to be able to see Jesus.

There are discrepancies as to where the wise men came from, but whether the wise men came from Persia or Babylon, it is theorized that the wise men traveled upwards of 1200 miles to present their gifts to Jesus. It would have taken anywhere between three months and a year for them to arrive.

Looking at these two verses and the added details, my questions to you are: What are you willing to sacrifice to be in the presence of the Jesus? How far are you willing to travel to be in the presence of Jesus?

Do you attend church regularly? Do you purposefully include God in your times of fellowship? Do you go out of your way to help others in the name of Jesus? The unfortunate reality is that there are Christians out there who are not even willing to walk across the street to attend church, much less go out of their way to sacrifice anything they do not have to.

I know the counterargument to attending church regularly is the response that, I do not need to attend church to be close to God. My response would be an analogy that one of my old pastors used... If you take the hottest log out of the fireplace and place it right outside the fire on the hearth, it will continue to burn and continue to emit heat on its own for a while, but eventually the fire inside will diminish and its warmth will depend on its proximity to the fireplace.

As Christians, we are not only called to live our lives for the Lord, but we are also called to come together in service, praise, and worship for the Lord. Sometimes these things come in the form of sacrificing our own wants and desires in favor of what the Lord would have us to do.

The Knights Templar are known as Christian Knights; therefore, almost everything we do is in the name of Jesus Christ and for the betterment of others. These mindsets and actions mean far less if we are not also doing these things in our daily lives.

I encourage each of you to evaluate the things that you do on a daily, weekly, and monthly basis. It is my hope that if there are places where you could use improvement, that you will make the necessary changes in your life.
