March Message from the Grand Commander

Sir Knights,

I want to celebrate two Romano-British saints whose feast days are this month. The one everyone knows about is Saint Patrick, whose feast is March 17th. Patrick was born in fifth-century post-Roman Britain into a Christian family. His writings tell us that at age sixteen, he was captured by Irish pirates and enslaved in Ireland for six years. He then escaped and made his way back home. He felt a call to go back to Ireland as a missionary to the very people who had enslaved him. As they say, the rest is history. A Confession

Sir Knights,

There is something I want you to know before we begin our 2025-2026 Grand Commandery year, before you come to the Grand Commandery session in March. About four years ago, I was approached by some of our Knights and asked if I would allow my name to be placed in nomination for the office of Grand Captain General in our Grand Commandery. I did not answer at first. I had to think about it for a month or two first. I eventually responded "yes," and I want you to know why before you attend our March session.

I did not respond "yes" because I wanted to be Grand Commander. I know that some of you are thinking that statement is a lie, and I know that nothing I can say will change your minds. I do, however, want all of you to know the real reason I answered "yes" before you make a decision about who your new Grand Commander will be in March. You may not like my motives at all.

I have been blessed to have had the opportunity to have had a close and realistic look at our order from the local, the state, the national, and the international perspective for the last fifteen years. Several years ago, I came to the conclusion that our order is rapidly approaching extinction in this country. If you look at this closely, you will find that this is not because young men do not want to become Templars. They are still joining in significant numbers. The reason our numbers are declining is that men are joining, taking a look from the inside, and then deciding that what they see is not what they were expecting, so they are leaving the order in greater numbers than they are joining.

Having come to this conclusion, I looked deeper into the problem and decided these men who were leaving were doing so for very good reasons. As an organization, we have gradually, over many years, lost our way, our sense of purpose. Without a shared sense of what we are about, any group of men will begin to imagine for themselves, individually, what the purpose of the order is and will begin to pull in different directions. Eventually, the organization loses focus, slows down, and simply sits there and accomplishes nothing. I believe that our modern Templar Order once had a noble and worthwhile sense of purpose and thrived as a result, becoming very successful at accomplishing our mission. I also believe that many, if not most, of our current Knights do not share any common purpose at all. Fewer than ten percent of us are holding the order together.

The reason I answered "yes" to the original question is because I thought that I might have a better chance to exert influence to reverse this trend and to start a crusade to restore our Templar values and mission if I were on the inside rather than on the outside. As is obvious, I was elected and immediately blessed with the best of all circumstances. I found a core of elected Grand officers who recognized the reality that I had seen and who were willing to devote, sacrificially, their time, resources, effort, and even egos to work together as a team to turn our order around in Tennessee. We immediately began to change our "corporate culture" and to work as a team rather than as a hierarchy. We hammered out a mission statement and a vision statement that expressed our personal opinions about why Templary exists and why it is so vitally important to the communities in which we live. We began to develop programs or courses of action that might help us unify and turn our order around in Tennessee.

As the years passed, new Grand Officers came on board, and a miracle happened. We found that these Knights shared our vision and jumped on board to help. During the past three years, we have refined these plans and implemented some of them. We have identified and recruited a significant number of our bright new Knights to be key members on our team as committee members and appointed officers. We are now on the brink of finding out whether we will succeed.

What I had planned to accomplish, personally, is now largely complete, and I anticipate that, if you choose for me to be your Grand Commander this coming Templar year, I will spend most of the year turning over the work that I have been personally doing to younger and more capable hands to continue. I have contributed what I can contribute, and although I will be happy to continue to assist with any remaining task work in the future, my work is essentially done. I have had my chance.

Our society is deteriorating at an accelerating rate. We need strong, courageous Christian men if we are to cure the culture we live in. Our order is modeled on the ideal of a Christian Knight who is courageous, strong, committed, moral, dedicated to excellence in everything he does, and willing to take action and work with other like-minded Knights to develop an internal, organizational culture that is necessary to bring about positive change in our nation. We need to restore manhood to America. I can think of no organization that is better philosophically prepared to accomplish this task. We need not look for instant gratification. The positive change we need to trigger will take an intergenerational sustained effort. So, we must continue to chip away until we succeed or until the Master comes.

Grand Masters' Sword

DePayens Commandery No. 11 in Franklin, Tennessee, has commissioned and procured a sword, hereafter to be known as the "**Grand Masters' Sword**." It is intended to be a "traveling sword" that will move from Commandery to Commandery in Tennessee. It is currently displayed at DePayens Commandery. Any Commandery in Tennessee may take possession of this sword by sending a minimum of two Knights to visit any meeting of DePayens Commandery. The Sword is ornamented with the seal of the Ancient Templars having the name of Hugh DePayens, the first Grand Master of the Ancient Templars, engraved on one side of the blade and the name of Jacques DeMolay, the last Grand Master of the Ancient Templars, engraved on the other.



The sword is accompanied by a leather-bound

journal, having the seal of the Ancient Templars engraved on the leather cover. As the sword moves from Commandery to Commandery, the date and name of the Commandery acquiring the sword will be entered into the journal.

The rules governing the movement of the sword from Commandery to Commandery are as follows:

- At least two Sir Knights from a Commandery must visit the Commandery in current possession of the sword in order to take it back to their Commandery.
- If a visiting Knight is a plural member of the Commandery in current possession of the sword, he does not count as one of the visiting Knights.
- If a visiting Knight is a plural member of two visiting Commanderies, he must count for both visiting Commanderies.
- The meeting of the Commandery in current possession of the sword counts even if the Commandery in current possession of the sword does not open or does not have nine members present.

- Stated meetings, called meetings, observances, conferrals, fellowships, fundraisers, educational meetings, and inspections all count.
- If at least two members each of more than one visiting Commandery attend, the Commandery with the highest score receives the sword. The score is calculated by multiplying the number of qualifying visiting Knights from a Commandery by the distance factor on the chart contained in the envelope in the back of the journal.
- The date and name of the receiving Commandery shall be recorded in the journal by the Recorder of the Commandery from which it is taken before the Knights from the receiving Commandery take possession of the sword.

As soon as the sword is transferred from one Commandery to another, the Editor of the *Tennessee Knight Templar News* shall be notified by the Commandery from which the sword was transferred, and all known future meeting dates and times of the receiving Commandery's meetings of any kind will be published until the sword moves again.

The intent is to encourage inter-visitation and fellowship among Tennessee Templars.

DePayens Commandery meets in stated communication beginning with dinner every 2nd Monday night. The only other meetings currently on its calendar are the Holy Land Pilgrimage Fund Raiser on Saturday, August 16th at 6:00 PM and the annual inspection on Saturday, November 1st, beginning with dinner at 6:00 PM.



Code Proposals

Code Proposal #1

Proposing to change Article XXVII – Conclaves Section 128.

Change to read:

A Commandery may not convene a stated Conclave at an hour different from that prescribed by its bylaws and the time of meeting therein prescribed may be changed only by an amendment hereto, regularly made, with the following exceptions: When the stated meeting of a Commandery falls on any nationally designated holiday, Christmas Eve, the dates of the annual meetings of the Masonic Grand Bodies of Tennessee or the date of the annual inspection, by action of the Commandery at a prior stated Conclave, the conflicting stated Conclave may be held on any week day within the period beginning not more than five days before and ending not more than five days after the regular date, at the same hour designated in its bylaws for stated Conclaves, provided all resident members are notified in the usual manner of the change at least one week prior to the date on which the Conclave is to be held. If a Commandery fails to hold a stated conclave the minutes of the next stated Conclave held should show why.

Reasoning to bring the Grand Commandery Code in line with the Grand Lodge of TN Code and prevent the requirement of requesting a dispensation to move to a stated Conclave.

Code Proposal #2

Laws Governing Individual Knights Article XXVIII – Liquor Traffic

Section 130. The Grand Commandery and any member shall not participate in the promotion of, or illegal sale, distribution, or production of intoxicating liquors, or drugs. 2015

Because this issue is addressed under the Grand Lodge Code, it should be removed in its entirety.
