Grand Prelate's Corner

The Christian author, Max Lucado wrote that "Faith is often the child of fear." If you give a man a chance between sure death and a crazy chance, he'll take the chance....every time. Great acts of faith are seldom born out of calm calculation. It wasn't logic that caused Moses to raise his staff on the bank of the Red Sea. It wasn't medical research that convinced Naaman to dip seven times in the river to cure his illness. It wasn't common sense that caused the Apostle Peter to abandon the Law and embrace grace.

At the beginning of every act of faith, there is often a seed of fear. The message is clear—as long as Jesus is one of many options. He is no option. As long as you can carry your burdens alone, you don't need a burden bearer. As long as your situation brings you no grief, you will receive no comfort. And as long as you can take Him or leave Him, you might as well leave Him, because He won't be taken half-heartedly.

So my Fraters, this statement, faith, is often the child of fear, reminds us that faith can sometimes arise or be strengthened in response to, or even as a reaction to feelings of fear or uncertainty. I am reminded of the Biblical statement, "God has not given us a spirit of fear, but of power and love and self-control." (2 Timothy 1:7)

Faith can inspire courage to take risks, pursue dreams, or stand up for what is believed in. Embracing Power, Love, and Self-Control reminds us that through faith, we have the strength to face life's challenges, not in our own might but through the power granted by God. Love casts out fear (1 John 4:18). Acting in love, whether towards ourselves or others, can often dispel the shadows of fear.

Self-control, a fruit of the Spirit, enables us to manage our emotions and reactions, preventing fear from driving our decisions. Therefore, let us rise and stand up for our Knightly and Christian teachings and proclaim Jesus Christ is Lord even in a world that negates that teaching.
