#### THE SHEPHERD OF ISRAEL

## Holy Land Pilgrimage Endowment Fund Bobby Blankenship, Chairman

It is the mission of the Knights Templar Holy Land Pilgrimage to send, at no cost of their own, full-time ordained Christian ministers to the Holy Land who would not otherwise have the opportunity to go. This state's Grand Commandery and sponsoring local Commanderies of Knights Templar cover the expenses of the pilgrim's travel at an estimated cost of \$4,800 per minister. It is our hope that the Pilgrim Ministers are immersed in the lands, the sights, the sounds, the history, and the past and present cultures of the Holy Land and that they benefit from the generosity of these several Commanderies. This is an opportunity to demonstrate to the profane how Christian Masonry can positively impact these ministers by providing them the chance to "walk where Jesus walked" to absolutely affect the preaching, teaching, and spirituality of Christian ministers. It is also an opportunity to show that Templar Masonry is grounded in the firm belief of our risen Savior.

Annually, Pilgrim Ministers from Tennessee are slated for the opportunity to make this journey. Currently, these pilgrims are funded under the umbrella of our Grand Commandery's ongoing Pilgrimage donation program. Unfortunately, due to situations in the Holy Land beyond our control, the Pilgrimage has been canceled for the last two years. Therefore, those ministers previously selected will be traveling with those selected during next year's campaign.

With that being said, we will soon begin our next selection campaign and encourage each individual Sir Knight and Commandery to be as diligent as possible in supporting both our ongoing fund as well as our Endowment Fund. Please be proactive in finding ways to support these funding activities. In 2019, we were successful in obtaining a 501(c)(3) charitable status and are classified as a public charity. We are now exempt from federal income tax. This fund is also qualified to receive tax-deductible bequests, devises, transfers, or gifts under Section 2055, 2106, or 2522.

We hope that you will remember this charitable fund this year. When making donations to either fund, complete the appropriate form and make the check(s) payable to: Holy Land Pilgrimage Funds of the Grand Commandery of Tennessee. There are multiple giving opportunities established, including our continued Knight Cross of the Holy Land jewel campaign, fundraising via social media, merchandise sales, as well as some very creative fundraising activities by our local Commanderies.

Finally, if you know of a qualified minister that has not been to the Holy Land and would benefit from this program, please put them in contact with me, and we will work with them through the process to make this a possibility.

#### A Time For Rebuilding and Reconsecrating, Part Two

If we are in earnest in the belief that we must as an Order make rapport with established religion – the Christian Church – we shall have to move quickly. Time is of the essence. The sand runs low in the hour glass. We must begin at once in implementing plans to join and progress the church militant. If every Sir Knight will make it a habit to attend the worship service of his church regularly and becomes active in its ministry in living the creed of the Christian Mason, a start will have been made to rewin the United States.

Let lanterns be hung in the symbolic belfries of the Order's asylums, even to the outposts, these signaling the direction to the "strait gate" Knights Templar would take in revitalizing the finer attributes of their heritage, and we shall be on the way to the nation's appointment with destiny. Let the drum beats of the high call be sounded in every Commandery and may bonfires confirming the individual consecration be lighted in the hearts and minds of Sir Knights everywhere.

This is a climatic hour for Templary. Those who are authorized to lead in Templary's cause – Christ's mission – must be tall men, sun-crowned. Indeed, every Sir Knight proclaiming the dimensions of this Order's sublime charge must be sure he looks up to Christ in personal and public life. Such a Sir Knight will so exhort his fellow Fraters that his every utterance becomes precursor to ask for recruits.

It is no longer enough to spell out the particulars and set forth the tenets by which redemptive efforts for the Order and its mission shall be accomplished. Evangelists from time immemorial have not been content only to preach the Word. They enlisted recruits, sometimes but one at a time, by open invitations to come forward and be enrolled. When men and women respond, when they walk the sawdust trail, or when under the exhortation of a Billy Graham, they come forward to make identity with a cause, then the pledge becomes meaningful.

The Most Eminent Grand Master addressed the closing hour of the Philadelphia Triennial as an inspired and consecrated Templar. No seer of Holy Writ ever made a more forceful plea for heroic action, for complete commitment to the Great Captain of our Salvation, than did Sir Knight Wilber M. Brucker. He sounded a prophetic summons in using the opportunity to reflect upon the Order's past and present in projecting its role for the future, a dynamic and purposeful role. Had he asked his hearers to join him in Templary's crusade, confirming their intent by rising to their feet, not a Sir Knight, not a Lady, could have, or would have, remained seated.

In every Templary gathering, no matter where held, let there be a showing of hands, of willingness confirmed b solemn pledge, to accept responsibility in the name and for the Order.

Let it be the Order of the Day that every prime speaker addressing a Knights Templar assembly put the first things of the Order first. More, let it also be the Order of the Day that suck a speaker's peroration be a call to definite action, to spelled out duty, in seeking new recruits among Christian Masons. The link with the Church should be overlooked. Every Sir Knight should be called to his feet and then there given such an assignment in building the Order as will comport with his willingness to accept meaningful responsibility.

This is a fateful time in the annals of the human race. Only if right prevails is there a chance for this nation to keep its rendezvous with high destiny. Right can only prevail if the Creed of Templary and that of the Christian Church motivates a majority of America's population. Only if this creed prevails can the moral and spiritual fibre of the nation be shored up. Knights Templar who take their calling and duty seriously will disavow the indulgences of ill habits, of bad example. They will not be afraid to walk to sawdust trail.

Consecrated manhood is the great need of this time, if we are to rebuild and to reconsecrate Templary and the Church to challenge and opportunity.

From Henri Frederic Amiel, Swiss philosopher and poet (1821-1881), writing in his Amiel's Journal, comes this admonition to men and nations:

"Civilization is first and foremost a more thing. Without honesty, without respect for law, without the worship of duty, without the love of one's neighbor – in a word, without virtue – the whole is menaced and falls into decay, and neither letters nor art, neither luxury nor industry, nor rhetoric, nor policeman, nor the customhouse officer, can maintain erect and whole an edifice of which the foundations are unsound."


